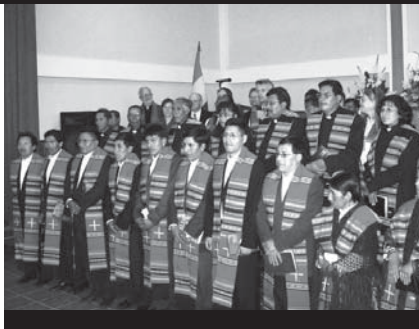

Thirty-seven ELCA missionaries serve in a dozen Lutheran church bodies in Latin America and the Caribbean. At least 1,000 more people participate in the lives of these churches through the **ELCA Companion Synod Program, which links ELCA synods with Lutheran churches around the world.**

The Montana Synod has an outreach to American Indians. Domestic violence is an issue in both communities. Both communities serve large rural regions and face similar challenges of sustaining small churches in remote

areas. "Discovering our similar challenges opens new ways we can look for solutions together," says BELC president, Pastor Cristóbal Alejo, after last year's gathering.
