



Resources to plant seeds of prayer and discipleship

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As part of the ELCA's evangelism strategy, new resources have been developed to help congregations grow in prayer and discipleship. Prayer video

With Hands Uplifted – A Call to Prayer is a new video produced by the ELCA's evangelism team. This seven-minute video can be used in Bible studies, small groups, prayer ministries, worship, council and committee meetings, youth group meetings—wherever and whenever the people of God gather. It is available both on DVD or VHS.

To pray is to trust. We trust God's promise to listen, to forgive, to renew, and change us as we pray. Just as a loving parent invites a child to talk at any time, God invites and encourages us to enter into a prayer "conversation" of praise, petition, confession, speaking, listening, silence, and song. The ways people pray—kneeling, sitting, standing, singing, dancing, at meals with hands folded or uplifted, in worship, work, or play—are as diverse as the people who pray.

With Hands Uplifted – A Call to Prayer is one of many resources developed to support the implementation of the Evangelism Strategy adopted by the 2003 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. The first objective of the strategy calls us to "... pray for the renewal of this church, so that every member, congregation, synod, churchwide unit and institution might bear witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ."

Through rich, diverse images and music, *With Hands Uplifted – A Call to Prayer* draws the viewer into new expressions and experiences of prayer. It invites, encourages, challenges, and stimulates prayer for

the renewal of the church. Because there are so many images in this montage, this video can be viewed several times, emphasizing different aspects of prayer. A user's guide (included with the video) offers helpful questions to engage in reflection and prayer.

This summer many ELCA camps will be using the camp curriculum *PRAY!* Daily themes include thanking, asking, forgiving, persisting, and listening. The outdoor ministry setting is an excellent place to explore God's presence in every aspect of life. Campers of all ages, along with staff, will explore ways to live in humble praise and thanksgiving to God.

New Bible study on discipleship

Daily Discipleship is a new ELCA lectionary-based curriculum available online at the ELCA Web site. It is ideal for groups desiring to focus on God's Word and apply that Word to their daily lives. This free downloadable resource provides a two-page reflection guide for each Sunday's Gospel, beginning with September 11, 2005. A different aspect of the call from Jesus to his disciples is explored each week around the question: What does this Sunday's Gospel teach about being a disciple of Jesus Christ? Each session has three components:

- Word of Life (Gospel text)
- Word Among Us (daily life)
- Last Word (a faith practice)

How to use it

Daily Discipleship groups can gather at any time in any location. Imagine groups of two to seven participants meeting for coffee, before or after work, to focus on the call of Jesus to be disciples. Or envision congregational chat rooms preparing for worship by exploring the Gospel text online.

Daily Discipleship is also ideal for a pastor's lectionary class. Excerpts can be used in bulletin inserts or newsletters. Here are the topics for the Fall term:

Users will be able to choose the date and type of worship they want to plan, and then choose the worship elements they want to include, in the order they choose. The *SundaysandSeasons.com* engine will deliver your entire worship plan in a single document—no more cutting and pasting, or swapping disks or files.

Congregations will be able to subscribe to *SundaysandSeasons.com* on an annual basis. The subscription cost will be based on average weekly attendance. Since *SundaysandSeasons.com* is a Web-based product, you will be able to use all of these features from your church or home.

The widely-used *Sundays and Seasons* annual print resource will still be the home for much additional planning material, plus deep reflective content and other study material not found on *SundaysandSeasons.com*

A companion to *Sundays and Seasons*, this planning guide and appointment calendar can be used both to guide your prayer and facilitate your planning. Each two-page spread includes propers (including *Renewing Worship* proposals) for Sundays and festivals, a weekly worship planning worksheet, and room for your schedule and your notes.

This simple four-color sheet is a useful tool for congregation committee members, worship planners, altar guild, teachers, and pastors. It includes dates and church year names, Scripture citations, hymn of the day suggestions, and liturgical colors.

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Keep Renewing Worship going strong

Assuming all goes well with the *Renewing Worship* proposal at this summer's churchwide Assembly, our church's new abook of worship, with supportive print and electronic resources, will be available to congregations in the fall of 2006. As that time nears, congregations will receive materials for and information about the introduction of the new materials.

The summer, when schedules slow down a bit in some congregations, may be an ideal time to offer opportunities for engaging in conversations around worship, remembering that the proposal is about far more than just a new worship book—it is about actual renewal. Perhaps planning now for a September introduction to or deeper exploration of *Renewing Worship* is a good idea.

The *Principles for Worship*, as well as the church's statement on the practice of Word and Sacrament, *The Use of the Means of Grace*,

continues to be vital and engaging resources for such a conversation. The videotape discussion starter, *These Things Matter: Word, Baptism, Communion* and the *Study Guide for The Use of the Means of Grace* are available from Augsburg Fortress to aid in such a conversation.

Available for free download at www.renewingworship.org/resources/video/ (see links down the right side) are several helpful resources, including a study guide for exploring the *Principles for Worship*, along with some of the provisional texts and songs.



Get ready now for the 2006 ELCA Youth Gathering

The community of Christ is coming together in San Antonio, Texas, for the 2006 ELCA Youth Gathering!

Some 40,000 Lutheran youth and adults are coming from all over the map to be renewed in their faith journey through Bible study, worship, prayer, service, and learning. They are crossing every kind of border to be with friends and neighbors who share the same name: Child of God.

In the company of the gathered in San Antonio, youth will learn to see Jesus more clearly, love Jesus more dearly, and follow Jesus more nearly. They will be opened to the many faces of God by listening to the stories of friends who are different from them. They will touch the places where wounds are, and learn that Jesus meets them before they're all fixed up. They will practice telling God's ancient story in new ways, and in so doing, create a future worth wanting.

This Gathering is about the young church risking being a certain way in the world together. It is about following Jesus' lead and crossing boundaries that keep us alienated from each other and from God. It is about our need for each other and for God. It is about the dynamic of life lived in the tension of God's ways colliding with the ways of the world.

Teenagers know this tension. A day rarely goes by when they aren't wondering how a loving God is active in a world that includes war, tsunamis, poverty, and hatred. Parents know it too. Many are scared and overwhelmed by the responsi-

bility of rearing faithful children in a world where the familiar boundaries of right and wrong are redefined regularly, where temptations abound via the media, where pressures to be perfect hold captive a teenager's attention, and where cultural diversity is redefining the face of the United States.

Even the church knows this tension. Once perceived as the center of people's lives, for many today the church sometimes feels less like a rock and more like a pebble caught in the whitewater rapids of the world.

In the community of the gathering, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, youth will see that faith gives them the strength to steer into the rapids of real life rather than navigating around it or abandoning ship.

Youth will learn how to recognize Jesus in the tension of the border situations in their lives and in the world. They will *wake up* to who they are in Christ, *look around* and see Christ in the eyes of those standing beside them, *turn around* and walk in a new direction, *cross over* and experience the "something new" that Jesus promises, and *go with God* into the world as witnesses to Jesus' way of compassion and justice.

There is the potential for young people to return home profoundly changed by their encounter with God through Christ in the lives of the people of faith they will meet at the gathering—from across the country and around the world—their friends, neighbors, and strangers along the way. They may act differently, not because

it is popular or hip, but because their eyes are open and their hearts changed.

Through this Journey with Jesus, young people have the opportunity, to experience their call to service in a new way.

The call is to get them there... and share in the experience.

With a MissionPlus account

- your congregation will receive a competitive interest rate on the funds that youth raise for gathering expenses.
- funds are available when needed for registration or travel expenses before, during, and after the gathering.
- funds may be added to an account at any time.
- at the gathering in San Antonio, you can easily cash checks on your MissionPlus account to get funds for meals and other expenses.

How to open an account now

Complete the application, include a check in the amount of \$100* or more, and send both to the Fund. Once your account is opened, your congregation's hard-earned Gathering funds will begin to grow and will be available when needed.

MissionPlus account details:

- The minimum initial amount to purchase a MissionPlus investment is \$100.*
- Additions to an account may be made at any time in amounts of \$100 or more; just deposit funds in a local checking account, write a check to the Mission Investment Fund, and send it to your MissionPlus account.
- Partial redemptions may be made at any time by writing checks provided with the MissionPlus check book.

- Interest is paid and reinvested monthly.
- There are no fees with a MissionPlus account (checks are provided free of charge).
- Only those who sign the purchase application (signatories) are authorized to act concerning the account.

About the Mission Investment Fund

The Mission Investment Fund of the ELCA offers investments to ELCA congregations, their members, synods, and ELCA-related organizations. With these invested funds, MIF provides loans to young mission congregations for purchases of land and construction of initial church buildings, and to established ELCA congregations for renovation, expansion, and relocation projects.

MIF currently has nearly 600 loans at work in ELCA ministries. More than one-third of ELCA congregations, most of the ELCA's 65 synods, thousands of members of Lutheran congregations, and many ELCA-related organizations such as colleges, universities, and social ministry organizations, are investors in the Mission Investment Fund.

MIF's church building consultants are resources to congregations that are considering building or renovation projects.

*The \$100 minimum initial investment applies only to a 2006 Youth Gathering MissionPlus investment. For all other MissionPlus investments, the minimum initial investment is \$500.

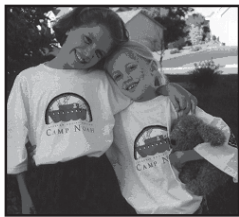

- *Being Lutheran in Social Ministry is...* This short study guide by J. Paul Balas examines the themes of Lutheran social ministry and the implications of that identity for the values, leadership, and practice of a social ministry organization. The information and exercises can be used in a retreat setting, or they may be divided up for a learning

series at several board meetings.

- *Being Lutheran Means...* This series of six short interactive devotions by Margaret Schmitt Ajer is for use with social ministry organization boards or other groups. Each session relies on conversation, Scripture reading, prayer, and reflection.

- *Becoming a Trustee of Lutheran Values.* Arthur W. Scherer has written this resource for use as part of an orientation program for new board members of social ministry organizations. The booklet consists of background material and discussion questions to fit a 60-90 minute time frame.

Study guide on health care

“Using ‘Caring for Health: Our Shared Endeavor’ in your Congregation” is a new study guide for the ELCA social statement on health and health care, *Caring for Health: Our Shared Endeavor*. The five-session guide focuses on key themes and issues of the statement. It includes helps for study leaders and five supplementary pieces. Convocation on ending hunger

On June 6 at 7 p.m., the first ever Interfaith Convocation on Hunger will bring together faith leaders from around the nation, including ELCA Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson, to draw attention to the scandal of hunger at home and abroad. Meeting at the Washington National Cathedral in a spirit of prayer, participants from many faith traditions will stand in solidarity with the hungry and millions of volunteers to feed the hungry and bring relief to people in need. The leaders and their supporters will call on President Bush and members of Congress to join with Christians, Jews, Muslims, and people of other faiths in a new commitment to end hunger.

People concerned with addressing hunger are encouraged to participate. On the days surrounding this Interfaith Convocation, June 4-7, Bread for the World, America’s Second Harvest, and Call to Renewal will sponsor a conference under the theme, “One Table, Many Voices,” which will bring together people intent on addressing hunger and poverty to learn, network, and advocate.

Small town and rural ministry

Approximately 55 percent of the ELCA’s 10,636 congregations are in small town and rural settings. In order to serve these parishes, the

ELCA Rural Ministry Office has developed the Small Town and Rural Ministry Alliance (STaR). This summer they will have their second national meeting July 28-30, at Bethany College in Lindsborg, Kansas. The conference theme is “Celebrating Rural Life.” Featured keynote speakers are Martin and Micah Marty. There will be worship provided by the Great Plains Coalition and Central States Synod, opportunities to network with others who are involved in these kinds of ministries, crafts on display, and vendors who will be selling rural life goods. What you should know about moving and relocation

Whether you are a rostered leader or congregation lay member, you may find yourself needing to relocate from time to time.

Moving across town or across the country, the moving company that packs and totes your belongings can play a large role in how pleasant the experience is. The following tips can help you select a moving company that gets the job done right—and at the right price:

- Start your search as early as possible. Ask friends, employers and co-workers for recommendations, and try to book with a company five to eight weeks before the move.
- Tell the company whether you are moving locally (less than 100 miles within a state), intra-state (100-plus miles within a state) or inter-state (between states).

Local moves are billed at an hourly rate whereas intra- and inter-state moves are

billed according to the size and weight of your shipment.

- Get at least three written estimates. Companies will generally give free estimates, but confirm this before an estimator comes to your house. If you can get an NTE ("Not to Exceed Price") estimate, do so. This means that the price cannot go above the estimate and it may be less.
- Make sure you discuss insurance coverage with your mover and understand the level of coverage you decide on.
- If one or more of your items (such as a piano) requires special handling, inquire whether the mover has the experience and equipment to do the job.

Find out what they *won't* move. Some companies choose not to handle high-value items and/or dangerous substances (corrosives, explosives, flammables, etc.).

In addition, many people feel more secure when they stick with well-known,

brand-name companies that have been in business for years and have built up a reputation for quality service. "When you contract with a mover, there are certain things you expect," says Tim Schneeman, Vice President and General Manager of Allied Van Lines, Inc. "Your belongings should arrive on time, in good condition, and at the agreed-upon price."

As immersed as we all are in "successful Christianity" (*40 Days of Purpose*, etc.), we all struggle to claim and reclaim this rich piece of Lutheran identity.

Creative ways to learn about global mission

How to fill the awkward gap between the end of Sunday school in May and the end of public school in June? St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Renton, Wash., adds a month-long celebration of global mission.

Children explore a different country each Sunday during the worship service. "Kids get a passport in the narthex, and then move between learning stations," explains Christian Education Director Kim Unti. "They visit a culture site, a craft site, a games site, and a Bible story site. Adult station coordinators and teen-helpers help children enjoy multigenerational activities at each stop."

Country packets from the ELCA Division for Global Mission are an essential resource for planning the annual event. Available online at www.elca.org/countrypackets, the packets offer information on 72 countries and companion churches.

St. Matthew's teachers use the packets to select and acquaint themselves with the countries to be highlighted. "The country packets help us get started," Kim says. "The background information, crafts, and recipes, are especially helpful and become part of a binder of materials that station leaders use to create the learning center."

June Sunday school offerings always go to support global mission. "Most summers we choose countries from different continents, but in 2002, we focused on Africa in order to lift up the ELCA World Hunger Appeal's Stand With Africa campaign," says Kim. "After visiting Tanzania, Ethio-

pia, Madagascar, and Senegal, we held an African festival on the fifth Sunday, and built a mud hut with a straw roof. It stayed up through the summer."

Country packets: updated

ELCA country packets offer a wealth of information on countries from Afghanistan to Zimbabwe. Recently updated, most packets include:

- a country overview that provides informative statistics and commentary on the current economic and political situation;
- a history of Lutheran missionary activity and the companion Lutheran church;
- advocacy pages that outline issues of concern to the companion church and offer links to Web sites that explore the issues in greater depth;
- recipes, crafts, and songs;
- photos of the country and its people.

Use country packets to create adult forums, Sunday school activities, or to learn more about a country where your congregation sponsors a missionary.

To learn more about global mission consider attending a Global Mission Event (GME) this summer. Under the theme "Gathered by God's grace for the sake of the world," GMEs will be held July 14-17 at North Dakota State University, Fargo, and August 25-28 at the Baltimore Convention Center, Baltimore. This year, Tsunami recovery is a focus of the GMEs.

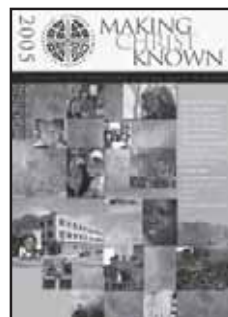

Helping your congregation become more welcoming

“Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.”
—Matthew 11:28

The rhyme, “Ginny and Timmy, sitting in a tree, k-i-s-s-i-n-g... First comes love, then comes marriage, then comes a baby in a baby carriage,” voices a common childhood wonder as we ponder who we might become. The sequence outlines a presumed order for each of us within life’s “normal” pattern.

As we grow older, however, we discover that there are many versions of this pattern and the sequence isn’t always predictable. For some, there’s a marked change in the course of events—the baby comes prior to a marriage, or there is love, but never a marriage, or there is marriage, but no need for a baby carriage.

For some people, the traditional reference to gender doesn’t apply as they encounter and engage in same-gender partnerships and relationships.

These realities sometimes become a part of our lives, our families, and our faith communities.

Aside from the different interpretations or opinions about any one of these relationships, there is a common issue at heart. They all reflect a deep desire for relationship, love, and community. People want to feel welcomed, accepted, and embraced for who they are. We all want to belong.

According to Matthew 28:19, the role of the church must be to go, without reserva-

tion, into the world and beneath each person’s life circumstance to provide opportunities for everyone to grow in a relationship with Jesus in a gracious, welcoming, and redeeming community.

Ways to offer hospitality and welcome

- Nurture a climate that honors Matthew 11:28: “Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.” Assume that all who gather, including you, come with sin and a yearning for acceptance and forgiveness.
- Evaluate your programs and small group ministries for inclusivity. Consider the implications and limitations of their titles and content.
- When planning programs for specific groups, be aware of your potential audience. Don’t assume that the stages within the family-life cycle correspond to a traditional family configuration, age range, or orientation.
- Promote your programs and events in such a way that they will welcome anyone who may want to come, i.e., “*Mothers with Young Children*” could imply married and unmarried mothers. The success of these programs, however is dependent upon the authentic hospitality of your leaders and participants.
- Train leaders to be non-judgmental as they provide occasions for encountering

God’s love and saving grace and as they address real issues and life concerns.

- Embrace issues that are known to stress the hearts of members in your congregation and community. Provide resources for people to receive confidential support. Also, talk with individuals and families about the value of gathering together with others who may have a similar need for support.
- Pray for hearts of gracious hospitality so that our congregations do not withhold ministry, Word and Sacrament, from anyone who comes with a humble heart and faithful intent.
